

# 2023 Collaborative Group of the Americas on Inherited Gastrointestinal Cancers (CGA-IGC) & Fight Colorectal Cancer (Fight CRC) Award

# **Request for Applications**

**❖ FOCUS:** Early Career Award in Hereditary, Familial or Early-Age Onset CRC in the United States

Fight CRC and CGA-IGC's joint <u>vision</u> is to improve the lives of those with hereditary and familial colorectal cancer syndromes.

Fight CRC and CGA-IGC's joint <u>mission</u> is to advance the care of patients and family members with hereditary and familial colorectal cancer syndromes by ensuring that cutting-edged clinical care paradigms inform patient support tools and policy change in an equitable and inclusive manner.

Please review this document carefully prior to submission to ensure you have all parts of the application needed to complete the online submission. A checklist is provided at the end of this document.

## **OBJECTIVE**

- In collaboration with, and support from Fight Colorectal Cancer (Fight CRC), The Collaborative Group of the Americas on Inherited Gastrointestinal Cancer (CGA-IGC) is offering research or project awards for early career investigators/clinicians.
- This mechanism will support research, quality improvement, or patient engagement projects that improve the lives of patients and/or their family members with hereditary colorectal cancer syndromes, early-age onset colorectal cancer, or familial colorectal cancer. <u>The project</u> should have a specific focus on colorectal cancer.

#### **DESCRIPTION**

An award of up to \$15,000 for 1 year will be given to unique and creative projects based on competitive review. Projects do not necessarily require previous work or preliminary data. These awards are not designed to fund existing or ongoing activities. Grants submitted with matching funds will receive special attention. Each award will be for one year; however, a no-cost extension may be considered with appropriate justification and approval by the CGA-IGC Grant Review Committee.



- The proposed research or activity must be investigator-initiated and conducted within the United States.
- The principal investigator must be a member in good standing of CGA-IGC at the time of grant submission and during the award period.
- Applicant must be early career, defined as:
  - Trainees with strong mentor letter of support.
  - Within 5 years of completion of terminal training.
  - Established investigators are not eligible (defined as those who hold an NIH grant (R01, R29), a VA HSR&D Merit Award).
- Trainee applicants must have a mentor attesting to oversight and commitment to project completion in a letter of support.
- Members of the CGA Grant Review Committee are ineligible to receive funding from this award; however, can be co-investigators or advisors.
- Investigators may submit one application per CGA mechanism, per funding cycle.
- Awards not funded may be considered for other CGA grants, at the discretion of the Grant Review Committee.

# \*Important! Full CGA-IGC membership in good standing is required. To Join CGA-IGC, <u>click here.</u>

- The awarding of a grant, or renewal of an existing grant, is at the discretion of the Grant Review Committee and can be suspended from year to year.
- The scope of the proposed project should match the grant budget. All or part of a submitted proposal cannot be funded by another institution or agency, either local or national other than in the form of a matching grant.
- The submitting investigator and mentor, if applicable, agree to complete the project based on the specific aims and budget submitted. Changes in specific aims or scope of the proposed project may be allowed with appropriate justification and approval by the CGA-IGC Grant Review Committee.
- Salary support for the investigator(s), travel funds or institutional indirect costs are not allowed.
- A final report will be submitted to the Grant Review Committee within three months of completion of the grant period.
- Awardees will be asked to participate in Fight CRC/CGA-IGC webinars and/or interviews to promote funded work.
- Successful applicants must agree to acknowledge Fight CRC and CGA-IGC support in any publications or
  presentations that result from the research or project, with the following text: "Supported by Fight
  Colorectal Cancer and the Collaborative Group of the Americas on Inherited Gastrointestinal Cancer."
- All awards will be recognized at the CGA-IGC annual meeting. One or more of the investigators
  participating in the project are required to present their findings or outcomes of the project to the CGA-IGC membership at the annual meeting.

In evaluating the merits of an application, the Committee will consider the following:

- 1. The nature and clarity of the project as a discrete, well-defined activity that can be completed within the proposed study period.
- 2. Clinical or scientific significance or relevance of the project as it pertains to the field of inherited colorectal cancer syndromes, early-age onset, or familial colorectal cancer.
- 3. Overall impact of the proposal (e.g., number of individuals or institutions that will benefit).
- 4. Availability of other resources to complete the proposal.
- 5. Ability of the investigator(s) to complete the Specific Aims or objectives of the proposal.
- 6. Project feasibility (including the availability of adequate resources, personnel, and facilities) and measures of outcome.





- Documents should be formatted using 1" margins and a font no smaller than 11 point. The scientific proposal (Significant Aims + Research Plan/Strategy) must be no more than 5 pages TOTAL.
- Applications must be submitted through the CGA-IGC Grant Portal. All requested fields must be completed. A PDF copy of the grant application can be submitted through this portal. Please email info@cgaigc.com with any questions or for technical assistance.
- All parts of the application must be submitted by August 22, 2023, before 5.00 PM PT to be considered for review.

#### ALL sections below are counted in the 5-page-limit

#### 1. Technical Abstract

#### 2. Background/Significance/Innovation

- Briefly review background material for the proposal while critically evaluating existing knowledge and present the significance of the topic.
- Why the project is important, specifics of how this proposal promotes the mission of the CGA-IGC and Fight CRC, and who will benefit from the project.

#### 3. Specific Aims & Hypotheses

- Clearly and concisely state the hypothesis to be tested and what the project is intended to accomplish.
- 4. Pilot Data/Preliminary Work (not required)
- 5. Project Plan/Strategy

#### **Project or Experimental Design**

 Description of the project design, primary and secondary measurable outcomes, and a timeline covering the period of funding.

#### Planned Analysis/Statistics

#### **Expected Outcomes**

- That includes interpretation of possible outcomes.

#### The Sections below items are excluded from the 5-page-limit

## 6. References Cited

 List all citations of literature at the end of the research plan, in the order in which they are cited in the proposal. Each complete citation must include the names of the first three authors, the complete title of any article, the name of the book or journal, volume number, page numbers, and year of publication.

#### 7. Institutional Review Board (IRB) status

 If the proposal involves the participation of human subjects, this section should include institutional review board status (approved, submitted, pending submission). Please note IRB approval is not required at the time of proposal submission, but approval or submitted raises feasibility of project).

#### 8. Conflict of interest

 All applications should consider and address conflict of interest issues regarding copyright materials (device and drug patents).

#### 9. Budget

 A detailed proposal budget should be included. Indicate how the funds will be allocated and justify each budget item.

# 10. Supporting Letters

- A letter of support from the home sponsoring institution is needed that should describe the necessary administrative and other assistance they are willing to provide, including time and financial support to present project results at the CGA-IGC national meeting.
- Provide letters of support from all collaborators, particularly if multiple institutions are involved.
